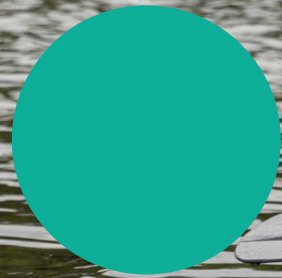

## Dr. Paula M. Rooney and Dr. P. Gerard Shaw

For more than two decades, our YMCA and the Commonwealth have benefitted from a rare leadership synthesis in the form of the husband-and-wife-powerhouse that is Paula Rooney and Gerry Shaw, recognized with this year's Chair's Award for their incredible impact on our YMCA and the communities we serve.

Dr. Paula M. Rooney, President of Dean College, and Dr. P. Gerard Shaw, Dean of the Dean R. Sanders '47 School of Business, Director of the Dean Leadership Institute, and Associate Professor of Business, enjoy the well-earned reputation of positively impacting youth of all ages, especially college students, locally, throughout the state, and beyond.

Their bond with our YMCA has been strong for decades. Gerry served as a member of the YMCA's Board of Directors for more than 25 years, including as Chair from 2003-2005. During that time, both Paula and Gerry strengthened the Y's relationship with Dean College, including Paula's establishment of the annual Dean College Scholarship for YMCA teen leaders, which began in 2003, awarding a full academic scholarship for a YMCA teen leader each year.

Paula, who has served on our YMCA's Board of Incorporators, frames the impact of collaborating with the YMCA over the years, "What we have accomplished was something that we could not have done alone. It's about the partnerships we've forged and the relationships with those on our teams, including those leaders and philanthropists who span both organizations. The integration of it all—focusing on young people—has made the difference."

Gerry adds, "This includes our son Paul who has been greatly impacted by his YMCA experiences over the years and the joy we felt as a family through the building of Grandma's Place at the Bernon Family Branch."

Gerry and Paula agree that the values he learned at the YMCA are one of Paul's anchors in life. "It also reflects who we are as a family. It made sense from the very beginning that we would be part of the Y, and that the Y would become part of our family," shared Paula.

YMCA Board Chair Eric Kevorkian states, "If one could boil down the leadership of Gerry and Paula in two words, to me those words would be dedication and compassion. They are not only dedicated to each other, but they have dedicated their professional lives to educating our young adults and gave their personal time to help this organization and others make a difference in the lives of our youth. And as they lead, inspire, challenge and innovate, Gerry and Paula do so with the compassion to recognize that not everyone is the same and that organizations like our Y need volunteers and partners to make lives better for youth, families, and our communities. In that sense, they are a true power couple."

These honorees share a mutual outlook on their almost three decades of service to our community, noting that their roles have been fun and enjoyable, given the many relationships and friendships they have fostered, especially with recently retired YMCA CEO Ed Hurley and his wife Sue.

As Paula summed up, "When similar missions merge into a singular focus on helping young people succeed in life, the hard work is well worth it. That's what we've accomplished with our YMCA partners."

Even more impressive is the philanthropic leadership and community service Kevin provides outside of the day to day to the communities and organizations he serves including the Hockomock Area YMCA.

Kevin's YMCA roots began young as he grew up at the Attleboro YMCA playing in after school activities and basketball, working the games and eventually volunteering at Camp Finberg in Norton. Continuing his involvement during his younger years, Kevin was active with the Leaders Club and became a lifeguard at the Hockomock Area YMCA in 1994 working the early morning shift. From his early beginnings to an adult, the YMCA has always been an organization Kevin has been committed to.

With the Hockomock Area YMCA, a deeper connection began 12 years ago when friend and fellow board member Michael Patch invited the Cryan family to attend our Y's Legends Ball. "Watching the boys and girls this event supports grow up over the years into young men and women has been amazing to see. To be part of an organization like the Hockomock Area YMCA that gives these kids an opportunity to thrive is very special," Cryan said with a smile. Kevin and his wife Kim, through extended family understand the challenges these kids face. "It's always been about supporting the cause and if we can be a part of it, we will."

"Improving the landscape of the community is our company's mission and that goes well beyond our day to day operations. As we come up on 30 years of operating, it has always been important to give back to the community and support efforts like the Integration and inclusion programs at the Hockomock Area YMCA," stated Kevin.

Throughout the years, Kevin and the Cryan family have been

friends of the Hockomock Area YMCA in a variety of ways. From helping maintain the YMCA's properties, serving on the Board of Incorporators, to helping and coordinating with Subaru New England to secure and hand out turkeys around the holidays for those in need, Kevin and his family have always been there to answer the call and step up to assist.

In addition to their Hockomock Area YMCA efforts, Kevin and his wife Kim are heavily involved in many local organizations and causes including Sturdy Memorial Hospital, Bishop Feehan High School, the Joe Andruzzi Foundation, Attleboro Rotary, North Attleboro and Attleboro Youth Sports, the Attleboro YMCA and maintaining 14 Adopt-a-Spots for the City of Attleboro. Kevin has also laced up his running shoes three times running the Boston Marathon for local charities raising just under \$50,000 and most recently organized in April 2020 with Jack Lank a 100-vehicle parade during the pandemic to honor and thank essential workers and healthcare staff working at Sturdy Memorial Hospital.

When asking Kevin what he would say to others that have the ability to make a difference in their community, he simply replied, "If not you, then who else will do it?"

# TONY CALCIA CHILD PROTECTION AWARD

Recognizing passionate leadership in proactively protecting children in our communities from child sexual abuse

## Ed Hurley

Our YMCA is proud to be the largest youth serving organization in our area, providing a safe, nurturing place for children and families to belong, learn and grow. Parents entrust our Y with the care of their children every day, which is our greatest responsibility and privilege.

In 2011, under the leadership of our Y's former CEO Ed Hurley, we adopted the Stewards of Children training as part of our commitment to child protection and education. This powerful program was created by Darkness to Light, a national leader in child sexual abuse prevention. Through this innovative partnership, the Hockomock Area YMCA became a leader locally, statewide and nationally working with others to eradicate child sexual abuse through community-based prevention.

Over the years, our work in protecting kids deepened. Ed was a founding member of a group of YMCA CEOs who came together to drive this conversation on a national level. Today there are 29 Y CEOs on the board for YMCA Champions for Child Protection, working towards consistent implementation of the best practices, policies and procedures for the care and protection of children across the Y movement.

Ed served as the first chair and in recent years helped to usher in a peer review program in Massachusetts and across the country. Y professionals and national experts in the field of abuse prevention now visit YMCAs to conduct child protection audits and reviews. As a result, policies and procedures at our Y are continuously reviewed and assessed to ensure the highest level of child safety in all of our programs. The goal is for every YMCA in the country to receive this review accreditation.

"We doubled-down on this vital part of our mission," noted YMCA CEO Jim Downs. "Our Board of Directors and staff fully committed our Y's resources and strategic focus to bring education and training regarding child sexual abuse prevention to the forefront."

"Ensuring the safety and well-being of young people is the

foundation of everything the Y does," noted Ed. "Protecting children is every adult's responsibility. One of the many blessings of my life has been working with others to ensure that our Y has a vibrant culture and that we are doing all we can to protect children from abuse."

Jim Downs shared, "It is only fitting that Ed Hurley have the distinct honor of receiving the Tony Calcia Child Protection Award for his tireless efforts during his 28-year career leading our YMCA. Tony would be so proud of Ed receiving this honor. Our entire Y community could not be prouder of Ed's legacy, and this particular program stands tall among all of Ed's many accomplishments."

At the Y, we will forever be dedicated to preventing, recognizing, and reacting responsibly to child abuse. Creating a safe path for children and protecting their only childhood will be the legacy of Ed Hurley, as well as his beloved colleague, the late Tony Calcia.

In recognition of Ed's steadfast dedication and unwavering passion to child safety and protection, our YMCA is honored to present the Tony Calcia Child Protection Award to Ed Hurley. At the Hockomock Area YMCA, child protection will be a bright beacon for future generations who seek a safe and nurturing community.

## Tiffany Chaplin Invensys Foxboro Branch



Whenever Tiffany Chaplin is at the Y, she is enthusiastically and warmly welcoming the children she sees enter the building. Inclusion is what Tiffany loves most about the Y. "I love how inclusive the Y is. There are so many programs for so many types of people and the Y accommodates the needs of all," declares Tiffany.

Tiffany recollects her earliest memories as a ten year old attending traditional day and sports camps at the Foxboro Y. In her teen years, it was her triplet Jenna who worked as a counselor-in-training and would come home telling Tiffany her camp stories. "My sister's camp days sounded so fun and made me want to pursue becoming a camp counselor the next summer." For the last two summers, Tiffany has been a camp counselor. "Camp brings such good energy. My life has been shaped by my experiences as a camp role model. The people around me – Y staff and my fellow camp counselors – have taught me how to work hard, find clever solutions to solve problems and ultimately be my best."

When summer camp ended in 2020, Tiffany didn't want to stop working at the Y. Tiffany became a gymnastics instructor and worked in our Y's Out of School Time program during the pandemic. She helped students learn the skills they needed to be successful in the new virtual school setting. "It was hard for the students to adjust at first to the virtual situation. In many ways, I was orienting them to understand this new method of learning and over time, everyone got the hang of it," says Tiffany. "The social interaction at the Y after the school day ended gave kids a sense of normalcy and a way to be active and have fun with their peers." It was through this experience that Tiffany was encouraged by Y staff to become a swim instructor for children with special needs through our Integration Initiative.

When reflecting on what she has gained from all of her YMCA experiences, Tiffany notes, "I have gained so much! I'm most proud of learning new skills, adapting and problem solving, growing and maturing. I'm more confident because of the Y. I can help others and I know I can make an impact."

Tiffany, a senior at Foxborough High School, plans to major in psychology in college with a focus on children. "The Y has definitely influenced my goals and aspirations. Helping children is my purpose. I love being a part of the Y community and contributing in a way that makes the Y a special place where children can have fun and feel safe," adds Tiffany.



## Natalie Krysta Bernon Family Branch



Natalie Krysta reminisces about the way her life has been rooted in YMCA activities. "I'm delighted that I basically started going to the Y from birth. At the end of the day, I'd be a completely different person if my mom had never brought us here."

Natalie attended our YMCA child care program, where she learned cooperation through play and grew into a thoughtful child. "My mom was a single parent then and it was a blessing to have these programs in our lives," recalls Natalie. "The Y gave my mom a great peace of mind when I was older because my sister and I could attend YMCA School's Out right at our schools. For us to be in an enriching program with people that my mom trusted was priceless." She continues, "My teacher Nisa was a big role model for me, and remains so today."

Natalie became an integral member of the Y's camp staff following a childhood filled with camp. As young as age four, she remembers not wanting to leave for a week of vacation because she loved everything camp! "I remember how genuine and enthusiastic all the camp counselors were. They went to lengths to ensure everyone was having so much fun. I knew that I wanted to be like them."

"We would come back to Camp Wiggi every year excited to see each other," Natalie recalls fondly. "All kids should have summer memories like these."

Natalie is currently president of our YMCA Leaders Club—a program organized for the purpose of providing knowledge, training and experiences to young people. She joined in sixth grade and calls the club a second home. "It's a place where I feel that I can be completely myself," says Natalie.

She has attended dozens of YMCA summer regional rallies and leadership weekends and consistently rolls up her sleeves to participate in community service projects with her peers. "I've been lucky to see how far fundraising dollars go," Natalie says. "Seeing kids who wouldn't otherwise be able to have a YMCA experience attend summer camp and benefit the same way I did is super rewarding and cool."

"I've had such a huge experience with the Y," says Natalie. "I'd say it's been positive, impactful and fun. I know fun is a boring word but I love that word. It should be in everyone's top three words describing the Y!"

Natalie will attend the University of Massachusetts Amherst this fall where she will study elementary education.

"There's a time and a place to move on, but I know the door is always open here at the Hockomock Area YMCA," adds Natalie.

## Andrew Porter North Attleboro Branch



Currently a sophomore at North Attleboro High School, Andrew Porter has been a Y member since he was seven, when he started taking swim lessons and attending camp. Since then, he has never missed a summer. Andrew, nicknamed "Porter," also attended School's Out, and in middle school, the Teen Center daily. He then joined Leaders Club and began volunteering for the Y, continuing a tradition of volunteerism in his family beginning with his grandfather Tom Kimbrel, a former chairman of our YMCA's Board of Directors.

Andrew quickly showed his passion for leadership and service, volunteering at many YMCA events, in addition to community events such as State Rep. Elizabeth Poirier's Senior Spectacular and Downtown North Attleboro Events like the Chocolate Stroll. Andrew is the first to arrive at events with clipboard in hand and a list of responsibilities prepared from the night before.

In November 2020, Andrew began volunteering for the Food Access Program distributing food each week to people in need. Andrew described his experience, "I felt like I really made a difference. It's truly an amazing feeling to get to make a difference in someone

else's life." Andrew also volunteered as a Cadet at Camp Elmwood at the North Attleboro Branch.

Andrew's favorite Y activity is the Leaders Club. "I have learned a lot at Leaders, like what qualities make an ideal leader, and why some leaders are better than others," exclaims Andrew. "You don't always have to lead, sometimes you have to step down and let someone else step up. That's something I try to do all the time." In 2021, between Andrew's involvement at the Teen Center, Leaders Club, Camp Elmwood, and Food Access, he accrued over 500 service hours. While attending Leaders School, he was the recipient of the prestigious Leadership, Service, and Advocacy Award.

This past September, Andrew became a Y employee, working as a sports instructor. He is an avid drummer and a member of the North Attleboro High School marching band and jazz band, and on the yearbook staff. Andrew is interested in recreation management and journalism and hopes to attend Springfield College when he finishes high school. Whatever Andrew decides, we know he will be a bright light and a huge success.

## HopeHealth

The Hockomock Area YMCA is proud of our commitment to be a safety net for our friends and neighbors when they need it most. And because of the deep-rooted relationships we have with so many community partners, we are able to continue to meet new and emerging needs in the 15 communities we are proud to serve.

Losing a loved one is extremely difficult at any age, but children find it exceptionally hard to understand and work through the grieving process, especially when they don't know anyone who has gone through the same thing.

For more than 40 years, HopeHealth has offered comfort, dignity and compassion to patients and families in Massachusetts and Rhode Island. One of their programs is Camp Braveheart – a summer camp now in its 14th year – offering a safe, nurturing environment to help children ages 4-17 cope with grief. HopeHealth's Chief Philanthropy Officer Suzanne Fortier explains, "We are really good at grief support. But, there are things we can and cannot do. We don't have a facility. We don't have program-specific staff like lifeguards or ropes course facilitators. We needed a place to call home, and the Hockomock Area YMCA is an amazing place to call home."

Camp Elmwood at our Y's North Attleboro Branch has become home to Camp Braveheart for two days every summer. HopeHealth and our YMCA have partnered seamlessly to help children in our area who have lost a loved one come together with other kids and adults who share that experience. Through this partnership, these children get a full camp experience at no cost. They swim, do arts & crafts, do the ropes course, learn archery, play games—along with therapeutic activities—all while forming life-long friendships.

When asked why it was important for HopeHealth to partner with the Hockomock Area YMCA, Sarah DeCosta, HopeHealth's Grief Support Manager and Camp Braveheart Coordinator, said, "Our missions align, and it's simple – we want to help people in the community. The more we partner, the more we connect, the more people we can help. It broadens who we can help and how we can help."

## Lisa Kingkade

Our Y's mission comes to life when we enrich lives through the support and dedication of individuals and organizations with a shared commitment to strengthening communities. We are so fortunate to work with one such caring partner, Lisa Kingkade.

Lisa has worked for nearly two decades serving the Milford Public School District in various leadership roles. Currently the District's Director of Social Emotional Learning, Lisa has passionately pivoted to meet the changing needs of her community.

In reflecting on the last two years, Lisa beams when she speaks of her collaboration with our YMCA, "YMCA staff are wonderful to work with. There's so much we've done together that's new and creative." This creativity has come to life through programs like the Out of School Time Program, the Milford Summer Academy and Camp RISE.

In 2020, when public schools announced a hybrid model that would require virtual learning support, our Y's Out of School Time Program provided students a space to attend virtual classes while supervised by Y staff. The program ran in six school districts including Milford. "This was a huge endeavor," says Lisa. "We had families who had to work and didn't have child care. This program gave our families a safe, nurturing place for their children."

The Y's Food Access Program, in collaboration with the school system, continues to provide grab and go meals and grocery bags to Milford families in need. During the school shutdown, some families were not able to get to Memorial Elementary School for pick up. Lisa spearheaded a delivery route where Milford teachers and Y staff would drive meals to families who needed them. "We were transporting breakfast and lunch meals daily to meet the needs of about 50 families," said Lisa. "It gave us a sense of purpose and a way to help. Families were overwhelmed and to see their gratitude for people caring about them, it was huge."

This strong relationship deepened as the summer approached. Lisa worked in partnership with our YMCA to create the Milford Summer Academy and Camp RISE - innovative summer programs free to Milford students. Both initiatives were realized through grant funding and provided a blend of summer academics offered by the schools and camp programming provided by the YMCA. "I'm so proud to serve as a bridge between YMCA staff and our Milford teachers. Our collaborations provided students with an amazing summer - they learned and had fun. Seeing the joy and the excitement on students' faces was priceless," Lisa explained.

Lisa strives every day to work with community partners to strengthen collective resources so that more people can receive the help and services they need. "I love the role I do here. And I love to work with people from the Y so enthusiastic to work side-by-side together to help more people. Together we can continue to do so much."

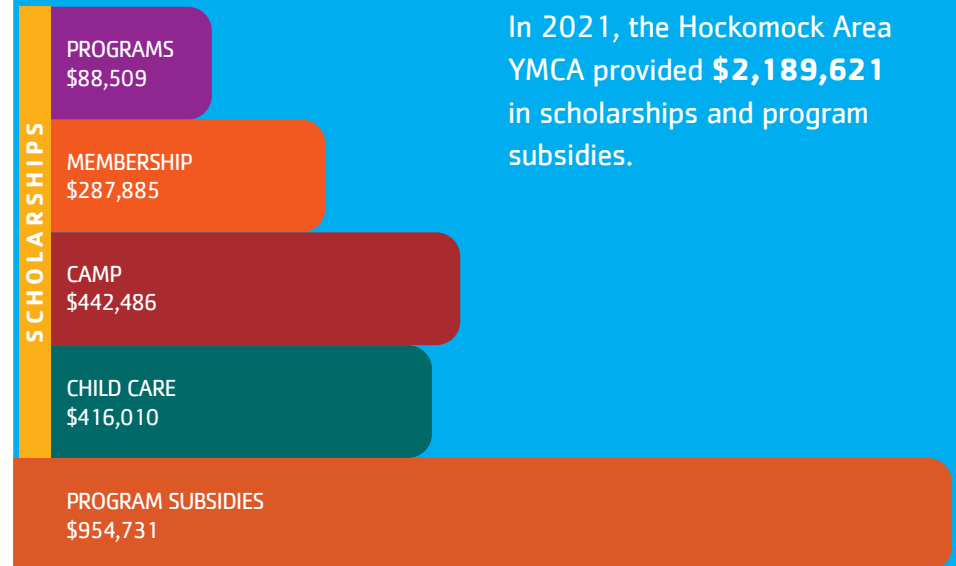
